#### **Biggleswade Academy Early Years**

### Early Years Pupil Premium Funding 2018-2019

#### Introduction

For the financial year 2018-2019 Biggleswade Academy Early Years has been allocated to date £ 2114.70. 3-4 year old children receive 53p per hour per eligible pupil up to a maximum of 570 hours (£302.10 per year). Due to the nature of our funding, with additional children becoming eligible for funding each term, this is a working document.

Three and four year olds will be eligible for EYPP if the child receives the universal 15 hours entitlement and they meet any of the following criteria:

#### Their family gets one of the following:

- Income Support
- income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- the guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided they are not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on, which is paid for 4 weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit For places starting in the summer term of 2018 (on or after 1st April 2018), or any subsequent term, if a parent is entitled to Universal Credit they must have an annual net earned income equivalent to and not exceeding £7,400, assessed on up to three of the parent's most recent Universal Credit assessment periods.

#### Further guidance on checking eligibility is set out below:

- they are currently being looked after by a local authority in England or Wales
- they have left care in England or Wales through:
  - o an adoption order
  - o a special guardianship order
  - o a child arrangements order

There is no prescriptive way in which settings should spend the allocated money but support should be targeted to support those children and those low income families to make as much progress as their peers. The following areas are considered when making the EYPP decisions to ensure the funding has a long lasting impact:

- Training
- Developing the home and setting learning environment
- Widening the life experiences of the child and the family
